## ORANGE COUNTY APPROVES PILOT PROGRAM WITH CLEAR AT JOHN WAYNE AIRPORT



At Tuesday's Board meeting, the Board of Supervisors approved a new pilot program at John Wayne Airport with AlClear, LLC — operator of CLEAR, a biometric identity verification service. The one-year pilot will introduce CLEAR as a complimentary service to TSA PreCheck, offering travelers an expedited and more convenient security screening experience.

CLEAR uses biometric technology, such as fingerprint or iris scans, to verify passengers' identities, allowing them to bypass manual ID checks and proceed directly to a streamlined physical screening. Kiosks and enrollment stations will be installed near Terminal B, with CLEAR representatives on-site to assist travelers.

The service, already available at 59 airports nationwide including LAX and San Diego, currently serves 80,000 members in Orange County.

This agreement gives John Wayne Airport passengers additional screening options, enhances traveler experience, and generates revenue for the airport.

## SIERRA VISTA MIDDLE SCHOOL SCIENCE OLYMPIAD NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

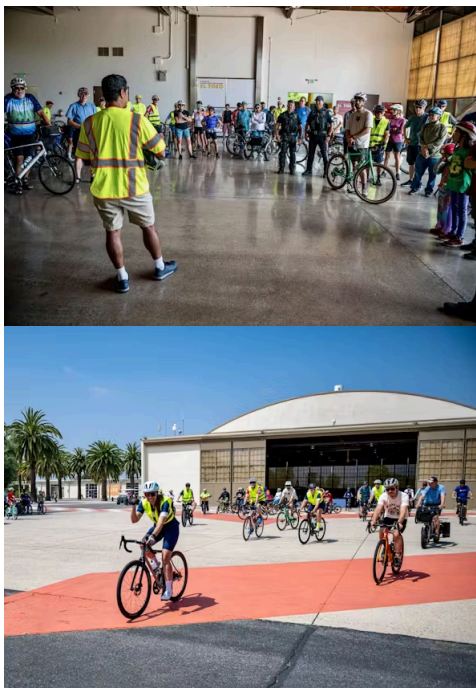

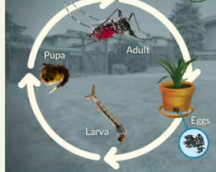

## LIFE CYCLE OF AN Aedes MOSQUITO



### MAINTAIN YOUR DRAIN

It's crucial to keep your yard drain well-maintained if you want to avoid breeding Aedes mosquitoes in it. These mosquitoes are known for their ability to lay eggs in even the smallest water sources, and a clogged or neglected drain can easily become a breeding ground for them.

In addition to yard drains, other sources such as bird baths, flower pots and gutters should also be regularly cleaned and maintained.



## MOSQUITOES IN ORANGE COUNTY

Are you tired of getting bitten by mosquitoes while enjoying a nice walk or relaxing on your porch with a cup of coffee? This mosquito is known as the arctic blue, also known as the Aedes mosquito. These black and white striped mosquitoes are known for biting during the daytime and can be found in every city in Orange County.

While the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District conducts wide area treatments, smaller sources of water around your patio, yard or indoor space can also attract mosquitoes. These insects only need a small amount of water to complete their life cycle, so it is important for every resident to take an active role in mosquito control.

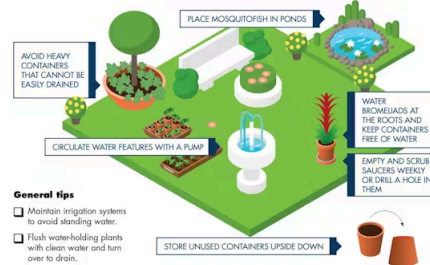

## MOSQUITOES CAN MAKE YOU SICK!

### Eliminate mosquito breeding in your garden.

Plants need water to grow. But water that stands for longer than 4 days can become a breeding site for mosquitoes. Water-holding plants can create hundreds of mosquitoes and increase the risk of mosquito transmitted diseases if a local outbreak was to occur. Use these tips to reduce mosquito breeding and prevent invasive mosquitoes.



### General tips

- ☐ Maintain irrigation systems to avoid standing water.
- ☐ Flush water-holding plants with clean water and turn over to drain.
- ☐ Avoid water-holding plants in displays that cannot be drained every 4 days (living walls, heavy containers).
- ☐ Root plants in material that limits standing water (e.g., perlite, plant gel, water storing crystals).
- ☐ Inspect garden weekly for mosquito larvae. Contact your local mosquito and vector control district for guidance.
- ☐ Store open containers upside down or place under cover to avoid rainfall and irrigation water.

### Water feature tips

- ☐ Circulate water with a pump.
- ☐ Flush out and replace water every 4 days.
- ☐ Use a larvicide treatment.
- ☐ Place mosquito-eating fish in water (often available for free from local mosquito and vector control agencies).
- ☐ Thin aquatic plants so fish can access all areas.

### Bromeliad tips

- ☐ Water bromeliads at the roots and keep the tanks and cups free of water.
- ☐ Keep any remaining standing water clear, free of debris, and flushed frequently.
- ☐ Prevent bromeliads from multiplying and growing into a dense mass.
- ☐ Avoid planting in landscapes or other features that cannot be turned over.

## ELECTRICAL FIRE SAFETY



Home electrical fires are responsible for an estimated 80,000 fires and \$1.3 billion in property damage each year. Protect your family and your home by following these electrical safety tips.

### Appliances

- Always plug major appliances directly into wall outlets.
- Unplug small appliances when they are not in use.
- Check electrical cords on all appliances regularly. Replace any cracked, damaged, or loose cords. Never try to fix them yourself.
- Place lamps on level surfaces, away from things that can burn.
- Always use bulbs that match the recommended wattage for each lamp or fixture.

### Outlets

- Never overload wall outlets.
- Insert plugs fully into sockets.
- Install tamper-resistant electrical outlets if you have young children.

### Extension Cords, Power Strips, and Surge Protectors

- Replace worn, old, or damaged extension cords right away.
- Only use extension cords for a short period of time.
- Do not run electrical cords across doorways or under carpets.
- Do not overload power strips.
- Use surge protectors, not power strips, with electrical devices that require a lot of electricity to operate.


### Electrical Fire Warning Signs

- Frequent problems with blowing fuses or tripping circuit breakers
- A tingling feeling when you touch an electrical appliance
- Discolored or warm wall outlets
- A burning or rubbery odor coming from an appliance
- Flickering lights
- Sparks from an outlet




# LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES


In today's technology driven world, lithium-ion batteries are powering electric vehicles, cell phones, e-bikes, laptops, toys, smoke alarms and power tools. These batteries can be dangerous if they overheat, and can cause a fire or explosion. Keep yourself and your family safe by following these safety tips.



According to the Data Bridge Market Research, the global lithium-ion battery market was valued at 6.70 billion in 2021 and is expected to reach 26.28 billion by 2029.

## Lithium-Ion Battery Fires:

- Emit toxic gases within seconds
- Burn hotter and faster than others
- Can't be smothered like other fires
- Can cause explosions within seconds
- Can reignite up to 21 days later!

## Safety Tips

- Purchase batteries that are listed by a Nationally Recognized Testing Lab (NRTL)
- Know the manufacturer instructions and safety information for use, storage, charging and maintenance
- Never overload your outlet when charging any device with a lithium-ion battery
- Never place the batteries in direct sunlight or a hot vehicle
- Store batteries in a cool, dry location

## Charging and Disposal

- Charge the device properly and only with the cords that came with the device
- Unplug the device once it is fully charged
- Do not charge batteries when the environment is below freezing (32°F) or too hot (130°F)
- Never charge the device under a pillow, on your bed or on a couch.
- Keep lithium-ion batteries away from combustible materials when charging
- Never throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash
- Contact your local recycling center or waste management department for proper disposal
- Do not put discarded batteries together in a container or pile

## Warning Signs

- Unusual odor
- Charge in color
- Too hot to the touch
- Change in shape
- Not keeping a charge
- Smoking or sparking when plugging in
- Unusual Noises (popping, hissing, buzzing)
- Leaking of liquid

## If You Have a Fire From a Lithium-Ion Battery

- Leave the area immediately as the batteries emit toxic gases and burn extremely hot, with explosions occurring in seconds
- Call 9-1-1
- DO NOT try to fight or extinguish the fire

## WHAT IS A PUBLIC SAFETY POWER SHUTOFF (PSPS)?

A PSPS is when an electric utility temporarily shuts off power to reduce the risk of a wildfire caused by utility equipment. Dangerous fire weather conditions — which include strong winds, dry vegetation and low humidity — drive PSPS events. Sometimes PSPS lasts over 24 hours.

## SIGN UP FOR ALERTS

Alerts are available for anyone. Before a potential PSPS, we'll send notifications via email, text or phone messages. We'll keep you informed during the outage and when power has been restored. Advance notifications may not be possible in unexpected weather conditions. Sign up for PSPS alerts in English or other available languages at [ocpsps.org/alerts](https://ocpsps.org/alerts).

## EMERGENCY RESOURCES

### PREPARING FOR PSPS

- Have a plan and prepare your home to keep your family safe during any outage. That includes a list of the location of emergency items such as water bottles, battery-operated radio, flashlights, fire and first aid kits, extra batteries and working batteries.
- Refer to our [limited checklist](#) to prepare for a PSPS outage.
- Download the [Orange County PSPS app](#) or download the MyOC mobile app.

### GENERATOR AND BATTERY REBATES

- A free backup battery to help power medical devices during outages is available to customers living at high fire risk areas and enrolled in OC's Medical Resilience Discount program.
- Visit the [SCL Marketplace](#) for portable power options and generators. Receive up to \$1,000 rebate for qualifying residential portable power stations and up to \$500 for qualifying portable generators.

### CUSTOMER SUPPORT PROGRAMS

### STAY SAFE DURING A POWER OUTAGE

- Never touch or approach a downed power line — stay at least 100 feet away. When safe, call 911 immediately.
- Unplug appliances and electronics to avoid damage or data loss. If you have electric grills or griddles, turn to operate them manually.
- Gasoline and gas-powered generators should never be used indoors. Generators and batteries should not be connected directly to household circuits without the appropriate safety equipment. Doing either is dangerous for you and repair crews.
